

Make sense of the muddle

Helping students organize language

Some students are just all over the place.

When it comes to expressing themselves, they don't know how to start. They don't know how to finish. Whether talking or writing, their stories and explanations don't make sense.

They don't know how to organize their language or their thinking. And they're struggling in school.

It seems like they're just in a muddle.

Language and thinking go hand in hand; when one is disorganized, so is the other.

Because language and thinking are neurologically intertwined, each influences the development of the other. Thoughts are held hostage by our ability to organize and verbalize them, and language is held hostage by the organization and clarity of our thoughts.

Students who struggle within one of these realms often struggle with organization overall. Their disorganization can bleed into just about everything they do in school: listen in class, grasp what they read, share their ideas, write clearly, solve complex problems, and tackle projects and assignments efficiently.

Too often, their teachers don't have the instructional tools they need to help them.

Thoughts and ideas are invisible. They live in your head.

They are brought to life through words, images, and movement. In school, teachers and students predominantly rely on language for gathering and sharing ideas.

Thoughts and ideas move from one person to another by way of listening, reading, speaking, and writing.

When language is organized, thinking flows smoothly, and learning does too.

When language is disorganized, though, learning and school performance take a nosedive.

Thanks to research, we understand why.

Language has patterns.

Language and thinking are rooted in patterns, the brain's best tool for making meaning. We choose particular words and put them together in particular ways to get things done.

For example:

We tell stories.

Stories begin with someone being somewhere and something happening, then follow with a series of events that are ordered chronologically.

We explain.

Explanations begin by identifying the phenomenon that's being explained then follow with how or why that phenomenon occurs.

Once you know the pattern of a story, they're fun to listen to and tell because you know how the ideas are supposed to unfold. If you start to tell a story and suddenly switch to a different pattern, others get confused. They can't help but wonder, "what happened?"

Even very young children can detect these patterns and a whole host of others, too.

We can help ALL students learn to organize language.

Seeing and hearing go hand in hand when it comes to learning.

Eyes help ears and vice versa.

Research shows that visual roadmaps help students organize new knowledge.

They do better when teachers pair what they say with images, and they do even BETTER when those images reveal the underlying structure of the information they are learning.

Analyze the major goals of the Washington, Jefferson, and Adams presidencies.	Showing Connections
Portray what life was like on the Oregon Trail.	Telling

You have to see the dots in order to connect them.

Unlike traditional graphic organizers (i.e., pre-made worksheets that get filled in), students learn to draw their own Brain Frames from scratch.

This puts them in full control of meaning making as they capture and organize their thoughts in real time.

One by one, they can see not only their ideas but also the connections between them.

With all their thoughts in view, they can see how to share what they know with others.

Brain Frames are universal tools for sharing ideas.
